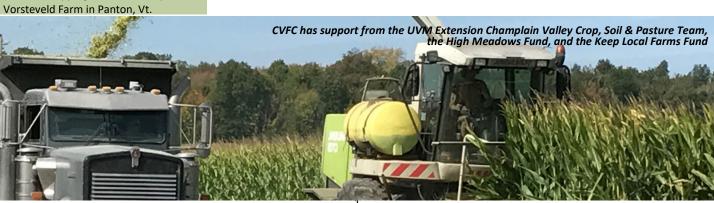

## **Annual Meeting Recap**

We had a great time at the CVFC Annual Meeting on January 25 with 106 attendees, of which there were 61 Farmers! Thank you to everyone who made this a fun night catching up with old friends and having lively discussion about the future of Vermont Agriculture. We elected four members to be on the Board of Directors: Chase Goodrich, Lorenzo Whitcomb, Tim Kayhart, and Loren Wood. Our evening entertainment was Bill Torrey from Jericho who told us some kneeslapping funny stories about growing up on his family's small farm and the hilarious things he, his brothers, and his friends did to entertain themselves and the life lessons learned as a result.





Our three Keynote speakers (Secretary Tebbetts, Secretary Moore, and Paul Costello) all talked about the importance of agriculture to the future of Vermont. Agriculture gives us many ecosystem services, and our tourism industry and economy is heavily reliant on a healthy working landscape. Our farms also have the potential to fight climate change and reduce carbon levels in our atmosphere by sequestering carbon through reduced tillage, cover crops, and perennials. We then had a good discussion with the audience about

what farms can do to create a bright future, what makes for a "real" Vermonter, and how do we better communicate and connect with policymakers about the positive things we are all doing. As farmers, we need to do a better job showing the public what we are doing and why. Open Farm Tours, hosting local schools, and connecting with people on social media all help farmers connect with their community. We also need to do a better job reaching out to policymakers and our local representatives to make sure that our voice and perspective is heard. We need to spend time talking to them in the Statehouse, and we need to invite them to spend a day with us on the farm. As for what makes a Vermonter, as quoted from Secretary Tebbetts, "a real Vermonter is someone who intends to die in Vermont!"

# Program Highlight "Media Training"

The Media Training workshop in December was well attended and participants worked on developing the skills to successfully navigate difficult conversations. From this training, participants learned some important tips for have productive conversations with other people:

Prepare - Think about your "Why". Develop your story, starting with "why?" Why do you do what you do? What is the purpose, cause, or core belief that inspires you to do what you do? When you think, act and communicate starting with Why, you can inspire others. People don't buy what you do; they buy why you do it. Understanding "why" is essential to knowing how to communicate "how" and "what" you do. After you know Why, then move on to How do you do what you do? (Approach, strategies, guidelines)

**Start Strong**— Introduce yourself, Use their name, and Ask questions

Manage The Flow—Build a bridge (Another point to consider is...), Flag your message (Here's what is most important...), and Connect to your experience (On our farm...)

**End Well**— Say thank you, Open the door to a future conversation, Commit to following up – and do it!
